

We have so many paintings, so many stories, so much on Google, so many interviews, so many chapters recorded in our lives by others.

This is the last to final piece in the jigsaw of our lives.

THE PAINTING

On 11th July 2020, Francesca and I decided to have our 50 years together celebrated and remembered in a visual/ artistic and original way to add to the penultimate story of our lives.

There are many famous artists here in the Bass Coast region. But it didn't take me very long to choose Josephine Allen (Josie Kent). She is a visual artist and I was familiar with her wonderful art work over the decades.

I asked her to do a non-traditional portrait of our lives celebrating a non-conventional relationship that has lasted over 50 years and that was all about 'Freedom to BE OURSELVES.'

Francesca and I are now in the 'elderly' bracket and coping with health issues, yet both of us are still pursuing our lives (albeit slowly) through various literary activities. Animal and bird companions have been a constant in our lives.

All we have ever wanted is to be ACCEPTED for who we are irrespective of our gender, age, colour, race, religion, politics ... Our lives have been about freedom, diversity, equal rights and a better future for everyone devoid of bigotry, hate and discrimination. We would like the same benefits that heterosexuals have and no longer wish to be seen as a non-conformists who are 'on the fringe' of society.

I truly believe that we have earned our place in society, as do all other members of the LGBTI community. We have earned the right to be accepted for who we are and to be treated as equals.

An Art Commission

It came to me on Facebook - 12 July 2	020

"We would like you to paint a portrait of our lives."

I knew they had been together for 50 years

I held a blank canvas in my mind

On that first visit to the log shack in Rhyll

I was enthralled by the light on the wooden panels inside

Greeted by Susie Q and Phyllis

And I sat on the edge of my chair,

Feeling in the design of the objects

That meant so much to them.







We interviewed each other

Got practical things sorted

I learnt about Heritage - Scottish, Egyptian, Greek, Australia I taped, made notes Heard the love story Family darks and lights Highlights and times I could not ask about. Yin and Yang Pisces and Aries Photographed throughout the house All things that sprung out to me The words: "Chesca wants to go back to Italy one more time." Gave me the composition The Pantheon! Baroque and operatic music gave the feel. I was excited. There before I left, Phyllis gave me a gift. "I don't want to interfere with your creative process. We choose you." And it wasn't the first time she had to say it! It took two-weeks to clean up my studio Filled with 16 little paintings of ascensions The last three months of work. I signed and stacked them ready for an exhibition As that canvas played in the back of my mind

Colours chosen, renaissance inspired, rainbow hues

Hints through messenger

I wanted to sketch them together,

But not to be, portraits not essential

Only to me.


More reading and another visit

I set the studio up.




I study their forms, animals, family, friends, gardens, house


Over the years.


Print out photos


Waiting for the merge

They form figures - yours


They form light

I am thinking impasto

But find glazes.

Yin and Yang

I go with it.

I break out my husband's box of brushes

The ones that he wouldn't let me use,

Because I was careless with their cleaning!

The fine 1-point sable brush becomes my pencil

And he is once again my muse,

Even though he is longer on this earth.

I illustrate the objects, the angels, the symbols,


The things that sprung out to me.

I couldn't resist the bird eggs.

I wash the brushes before I leave the studio


Each session!

I take photographs in the same light each afternoon.

It becomes a process

Working five afternoons each week.

I see in the third week of painting, that the circles

Foreground to back.

The landscape of their lives.

I dance in the foamy sea.

Tighten up the composition and technical elements

And bring the landscape into being.
